



SAFEGUARDING POLICY STATEMENT

Commitment

All contracted Instructors/Tutors/Assessors have a crucial role in shaping the lives of our Students with whom they work. This is a unique opportunity to interact in ways that both establish and inspire a better life style. This policy has been produced to help you safeguard all and reduce the risk of you being unjustly accused of improper or unprofessional conduct. Everyone has a duty of care to safeguard and promote awareness of the broader welfare extent, all in our society, specifically the issues facing young people.

Objectives

The aim of this policy is to ensure you are aware of and understand your responsibilities, that of others, signs that there may be a safeguarding concern, along with the reporting procedures for all safeguarding concerns.

Scope

This policy covers safeguarding of Children and Adults at Risk, both our Students regardless of their status. The provision of and those in the settings, where we operate which falls into the category of child or adult at risk. It is inclusive of specific highlighted safeguarding areas – as defined by law, and in the wider context protection of all. This policy also aligns compliance with the Government Prevent Strategy.

Definitions

Safeguarding is the protection of adults and children alike, at risk from abuse and neglect, promoting health and development, ensuring safety and care, and ensuring the best life styles. The Safeguarding Policy includes a wide range of potential risks (See Section F for a full definitions and indicators of Safeguarding concerns).

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SAFEGUARDING POLICY

A list of issues that require Safeguarding:

- Abuse (Physical, Emotional, Financial, Institutional, Sexual, Organisational)
- Bullying AND Cyber Bullying
- Child Sexual Exploitation
- Discrimination
- Domestic Abuse
- Fabricated or Induced Illness
- Faith Abuse

- Female Genital Mutilation (FGM)
- Forced Marriage
- Gang and Youth Violence
- Gender Based Violence
- Mental Health Concerns
- Private Fostering
- Radicalisation
- Self-Neglect
- Sexting
- Substance Misuse
- Teenage Relationship Abuse
- Trafficking and Modern Slavery

Definition of Child and Adult:

A Child is defined as anyone under the age of 18.

An adult at risk (previously vulnerable adult) is defined as any person over the age of 18 and at risk of abuse or neglect because of their need for support or personal circumstance.

Alongside the Safeguarding Policy above this could be due to, and not limited to any of the following:

- Expectant or nursing mother living in residential care
- Living in residential accommodation such as a care home
- Living in sheltered housing
- Person under supervision of probation service
- Receiving a service due to their age or disability
- Receiving a welfare service in order to support their need to live independently
- Receiving any form of health care
- Receiving domiciliary care in their own home

While the definitions of a child and adult at risk give the foundation for legislative intervention. It is important to be aware that a person may be deemed at higher risk of a safeguarding issue affecting them due to other factors, some of these being:

- Acting as a carer for another family member
- Background in offending
- Disability or social need
- English not a first language
- Poor numeracy and literacy skill, or specific learning need
- Under represented group
- Unsupportive employer
- Unsupportive home environment

Responsibility

Everyone at **VIBE CONCEPTS** has a responsibility to ensure that children, young people and adults at risk are protected from harm, informed about potential risks to their welfare, and to understand how to seek help. It is essential that all concerns are dealt with appropriately and in a timely manner. To have a responsibility to minimise the risk of allegations against you. All staff are expected to comply with any DBS check (or similar) request and to have a good understanding of what constitutes a safeguarding or welfare concern.

To be able to provide support, guidance in such instances and the process of escalating a concern, and the process to follow as stated in this policy. To assist with this continuous information, advice, guidance and on-going awareness training will be available for you. Which is aimed to help you feel confident in promoting safeguarding and understanding your individual responsibilities.

The responsibilities of particular individuals are detailed below:

- **Directors** - to ensure we have effective policies.

- **Managers** - to ensure policies are implemented and followed, and sufficient time and resources are allocated to Instructors to carry out their responsibilities.
- **Designated Safeguarding Officer** – to maintain links with Local Safeguarding Children's Boards and Prevent Coordinators, plan and implement training for all Instructors. Carry out investigations where appropriate into welfare concerns reported and liaise with external bodies such as safeguarding board where appropriate. Overall recording and management of safeguarding concerns and report to board on any issues that arise. Review procedures and policies on a timely basis. Maintain own CPD to ensure their role can be fulfilled competently.
- **Designated Deputy Safeguarding Officers** – to deal with Instructor concerns over Students' welfare, signpost and offer guidance to lower level concerns and liaise with Designated Safeguarding Officer for concerns requiring referral to external agencies. Carry out investigations where appropriate into welfare concerns reported and liaise with external bodies such as safeguarding board where appropriate. Maintain own CPD to ensure their role can be fulfilled competently.
- **Tutors/Instructors/Assessors** - to check safety and welfare with all Students at each visit / communication, ensuring Students' complete all safety related learning activities within their programme. You must consider the indicators that there may be a safeguarding issue – see Appendix E, and if required to follow the 5 R's procedure - our flow chart for reporting issues that concern them or are reported to them (See Appendix D). To carry out training as directed by the Designated Safeguarding Officer or Designated Deputy Safeguarding Officer in a timely manner.
- **Support Team** - You must be consider the indicators that there may be a safeguarding issue should you come into contact with a Student or potential Student – see Appendix E, and if required to follow the 5 R's procedure - our flow chart for reporting issues that concern them or are reported to them (see Appendix D). To carry out training as directed by the Designated Safeguarding Officer or Designated Deputy Safeguarding Officer in a timely manner. The topic of Safeguarding can be very sensitive due to the content and may be difficult for you to discuss. If you have any concerns over issues raised, please contact the Designated Officer as quickly as possible.

Safe Recruitment

VIBE CONCEPTS carries out a safe recruitment process and ensures that all appropriate checks are carried out on new staff who will work or come into contact with children and adults at risk in line with the law, especially, the Disclosure and Barring Service requirements.

Disclosure and Barring Service Checks

The Disclosure and Barring Service (DBS) is an executive agency of the Home Office and its primary purpose is to help employers make safer recruitment decisions and appointments. By conducting checks and providing details of criminal records and other relevant information, DBS helps to identify applicants who may be unsuitable for certain work and positions, especially those involving contact with children (those less than 18 years old) or adults at risk. Depending on the type and regularity of contact with children or adults at risk involved in a particular role, employers are entitled to make appropriate types of enquiry about the applicant's criminal record and seek a disclosure through a DBS check. **VIBE CONCEPTS** can undertake five types of criminal records checks depending on the role applied for:

Standard DBS check

This will be for positions that are included in the Rehabilitation of Offenders Act (ROA) 1974 (Exceptions) Order 1975. This type of check contains details of individual's convictions, cautions, reprimands or warnings recorded on police central records and includes both 'spent' and 'unspent' convictions that will be shown on a criminal records check.

Enhanced DBS check

This will be for positions included in both the ROA 1974 Exceptions Order and in the Police Act 1997 regulations. This type of check contains the same details as the standard check plus any information held locally by police forces that it is reasonably considered to be relevant to the post applied for.

DBS & barred list check (Child)

An enhanced check with information from the DBS's children's barred list is only available for those individuals engaged in regulated activity with children and a small number of posts as listed in the Police Act 1997 regulations.

Enhanced DBS & barred list check (Adult)

An enhanced check with information from the DBS's adults barred list is only available for those individuals engaged in regulated activity with adults and a small number of posts as listed in the Police Act 1997 regulations.

Enhanced DBS & barred list check (child and adult)

An enhanced check with information from the DBS's children and adults barred list is only available for those individuals engaged in regulated activity with both vulnerable groups including children and a small number of posts as listed in the Police Act regulations.

When and What Type of DBS Check is Appropriate

VIBE CONCEPTS and Designated Person are responsible for deciding which level of check is appropriate for a particular role and whether barred list checks are necessary. Even where a post has some contact with children or adults at risk, the definition of regulated activity may not be fully satisfied, but in order to safeguard our Students any unsupervised contact with Student will result in an enhanced DBS check with child barred list. The Safeguarding Vulnerable Groups Act 2006 (amended by the Protection of Freedoms Act 2012) defines what types of activities involving children and adults at risk are regulated and therefore require barring list checks. Appendix A specifies current posts at **VIBE CONCEPTS** that require DBS and/or barring list checks.

Regulated Activity – is a term that defines activities that an individual engages in. The criteria for regulated activity, differs for adult and children as shown overleaf:

Children

- Regular activity (once per week or 4 times over the course of 1 month)
- Teaching, training, assessing, mentoring based activities - working intensively and closely with a child
- Unsupervised activity
- Within specified setting

Adult

- Health care professionals - giving first aid or receiving first aid Receiving or giving personal assistance to those due to age, illness or disability (going to the toilet/ washing / nutritional advice)
- Person who transports or is transported because of their illness
- Provide assistance with cash, bills and shopping (allowing someone else to or shopping on someone's behalf)
- Providing assistance in someone's personal affairs or allowing someone else to do so
- Providing Social Care - being subject to or assessing the need for health/ social care

Individuals must not engage in regulated activity with either children or adults at risk if they have been barred from doing so by the Disclosure and Barring Service (DBS). How we meet our responsibility towards this is explained below. Further advice on types of DBS disclosure and the circumstances in which regulated activity applies can be obtained from the **VIBE CONCEPTS**.

Where we recruit for a role that qualifies for a DBS disclosure, the advert and further information will state and confirm the type of DBS disclosure required. When the most suitable candidate for the position has been identified, the offer of appointment will be made subject to a satisfactory DBS, Right to Work, references and qualification checks. In the instance that the outcome of a DBS check has not been received from the appropriate authority prior to Students visits being carried out, all visits with the Students, will be supervised by a person whose DBS outcome has been received and approved. The **Managing Director** will be responsible for arranging this supervision. Quality Assurance Assessment of this process will take place on a weekly basis.

As a DBS check forms part of our recruitment process, we encourage all candidates to declare anything relevant to the type of disclosure required for the role they applied for. Once an offer has been made, candidates should tell us of any further details of convictions, including those that normally would be considered as spent, cautions or reprimands.

As part of our safeguarding obligations, we will re-apply for the appropriate types of DBS checks on a 3 year basis during the allocated contracts with **VIBE CONCEPTS**

Confidentiality

Information provided in a DBS disclosure report must be kept confidential and only on a need-to-know basis. Such information will be handled in accordance with **VIBE CONCEPTS'** Statement on the Secure Storage, Handling, Use, Retention and Disposal of Disclosures and Disclosure Information', Appendix B. Any other information regarding offences must be kept securely and in accordance with our Data Protection Policy. We recognise that job applicants and our Tutors/Instructors/Assessors need to feel confident that information about their convictions will not be disclosed to colleagues unless there is a specific reason for doing so. Those involved in recruitment decisions should ensure that when appointing an individual with a conviction, they are advised as to whom within **VIBE CONCEPTS** knows of their conviction and the reasons why the information has been disclosed. If you would like further information on our disclosure process please see Appendix C.

Failure to Disclose Information Relevant to the Type of DBS Check Appropriate to Your Role

Having a criminal record does not necessarily preclude an individual from working at **VIBE CONCEPTS**. The decision as to whether a person with a criminal record should be appointed, or an offer of employment withdrawn, or employment terminated will be taken only after careful and thorough consideration of the outcome of any DBS check as well as the job and offence related factors as explained in Reporting Concerns .6.

Nevertheless, we request all Instructors to tell us about any information relevant to the type of DBS check appropriate for their role. This could mean, for example, that if your role requires satisfactory Enhanced DBS and barring check, you need to tell us about any convictions, cautions or reprimands or being barred from working with children as soon as any of these have been issued. Failure to disclose information relevant to the type of DBS check appropriate to your role would be seen by **VIBE CONCEPTS** as a breach of trust and confidence. Such acts are considered as gross misconduct and you would be invited to a disciplinary hearing with a potential outcome of instant dismissal.

Exploring the Relevance of Information Provided in the Disclosure Report

As explained in the previous section having a criminal record does not necessarily preclude an individual from working with **VIBE CONCEPTS**. The decision as to whether a candidate with a criminal record should be appointed, or an offer of employment withdrawn, will be taken only after careful and thorough consideration of the outcome of any DBS check as well as the job and offence related factors as explained in section Reporting Concerns.

Similar to the a recruitment process, a disclosure of a criminal record will not necessarily lead to termination of your contract with us and the decision will be taken only after careful and thorough consideration of the job and offence related factors. Any decision to terminate the contract would follow our Disciplinary Policy (or Probationary Policy if you have not yet passed your probation).

A member **VIBE FITNESS** alongside the Designated Safeguarding Officer will make an initial assessment of the content of the disclosure report. If the report provides no evidence of convictions or any other related information, no further action will be taken. If the report confirms a conviction or any other related information, a member of **VIBE FITNESS** alongside the Designated Safeguarding Officer will make an initial assessment of whether the information provided has any potential relevance to the post. If there is clearly no potential relevance, no further action will be taken. If the report confirms a potentially relevant conviction or any other potentially relevant information further exploration will be required following the process outlined below.

Exploring a Conviction and its Relevance

All discussions relating to convictions must take place after the selection process has been completed and will involve the line manager and a member of **VIBE FITNESS** and, if appropriate, the Designated Safeguarding Officer.

As part of the decision-making process they will normally meet with the individual to gain more information from the person about the nature and circumstances of any conviction.

The suitability for employment of a person with a criminal record will clearly vary, depending upon the nature of the job and the details and circumstances of any convictions. The decision will be made on the basis of a risk assessment to enable the applicant's criminal record and circumstances to be assessed in relation to the tasks he or she will be required to perform and the circumstances in which the work is to be carried out.

The following job-related factors should be taken into account:

- Does the post involve any contact with children or other vulnerable groups of Client or Instructors?
- Does the post involve direct contact with Client or the public?
- Does the post involve any direct responsibility for finance or items of value?
- What level of supervision will the post-holder receive?
- What level of trust is involved?
- Will the nature of the job present any opportunities for the post-holder to reoffend in the place of work?

The assessment is also likely to include consideration of the following factors relating to the individuals offence(s):

- Relevant information offered by the person about the circumstances that led to the offence(s) being committed, for example the influence of domestic or financial difficulties;
- The degree of remorse, or otherwise, expressed by the person and their motivation to change;

- The length of time since the offence(s) occurred;
- The seriousness of the offence(s) and relevance to the safety of other Instructors, Clients, the public etc.;
- Whether person's circumstances have changed since the offence(s) was committed, making re-offending less likely;
- Whether the offence has since been decriminalised.
- Whether the offence was a one-off, or part of a history of offending;

Following careful and thorough consideration of all these matters and consultation with **VIBE FITNESS** and Designated Safeguarding Officer, a decision will be made as to whether the individual should be contracted to instruct. If appropriate we may seek further information from relevant bodies when reaching this decision. If the decision is not to contract the individual, a letter will be sent to the individual confirming the reasons for this decision.

The above process will also be followed in the event of a criminal conviction coming to light after the formal offer of employment has been made or during employment. In such cases **VIBE CONCEPTS** would reserve the right to withdraw the offer of a contract where appropriate or terminate employment in line with our Disciplinary Policy (or Probationary Policy if in probationary period).

Reporting a Concern - see Appendices D for Process Charts

a) If a Student raises a concern/allegation with you: If the Student has a concern over their own personal welfare and wellbeing, you are to listen to and record all information given, making no judgement or assumptions. Take any actions required to secure the immediate safety of the child or adult at risk if deemed appropriate, this may involve staying with them until a responsible adult can be located. This will only be recorded on if Student agrees, and raised with the Manager, if Student agrees. You must report the issue to the Designated Safeguarding Officer, regardless of whether the Student agrees. The Designated Safeguarding Officer will then decide the appropriate course of action, and if a referral outside the organisation is appropriate. (D1)

b) If an Tutor/Instructor/Assessor has concerns over a Student:

This might be through observation, alleged by others or discussion. To follow procedure set out as point (a) If a Student raises an issue / allegation with the Designated Safeguarding Officer. (D1)

c) If a Student / Parent has a concern / allegation about a Member of **VIBE CONCEPTS'** Staff or Contractors:

All Students are to be informed that if they have a concern over their own personal welfare and wellbeing that they do not feel comfortable talking to their Instructor about, they are to contact the Designated Safeguarding Officer. Contact details for the Designated Safeguarding Officer and Designated Deputy Safeguarding Officer are available in this policy. The safeguarding policy is also available on our website, www.vibeconcepts.co.uk . (D2)

d) If a Parent contacts you to report a concern about their Child. Ensure you listen, and record the details as per a Student reporting a concern to you. Ensure you have contact details for the Parent.

You must report the issue to the Designated Safeguarding Officer. The Designated Safeguarding Officer will then decide the appropriate course of action and if a referral to an outside organisation is appropriate, liaise with the Parent as appropriate.

Be mindful of confidentiality as all Students aged 16 years and above, and of employed status are deemed to be adults, and therefore no information should be passed to Parents or Carers without prior content to do so from the Client. (D2)

e) If you observe a safeguarding issue taking place within the working practices of an Instructor's setting:

Example would be a practitioner hitting a Child, or observing inappropriate restraint techniques. Take action to stop the activity immediately, and inform the individual of your concerns, ask them to remove themselves from the area and advise them you will inform their senior. Take any actions to secure the safety of the Child or Adult at risk, this may involve staying with them until a responsible Adult can be located. Inform the Designated Safeguarding Officer. Be mindful of differences between poor practice and a safeguarding issue and apply your action appropriately. (D3)

f) If an Instructor/Tutor/Assessor reports unsafe practices or safeguarding issues to you within their working environment - Advise the Instructor/Tutor/Assessor to follow in house reporting or whistle blowing procedures. You may support the Instructor/Tutor/Assessor in speaking to the appropriate senior. Report the incident to the Designated Safeguarding Officer who will offer additional guidance and signposting for the Instructor, and will monitor the situation. (D3)

It is important you do not pass any information to other parties, or try to investigate the concern yourself. All concerns should be reported to **Delvin Clarke** in the first instance.

- If you require an immediate response call the Designated Safeguarding Officer immediately, it is noted that the designated officer may not be available out of normal working hours, so in circumstances where the individual is in immediate danger report the incident to the police on 999
- The Designated Safeguarding Officer will endeavour to make initial contact with regards the concerns within 72 hours.
- The Designated Safeguarding Officer will assess if the individual is at risk of significant harm and decide upon the next course of action, this can range from offering signposting to support agencies to referral to the police and local safeguarding authorities. This may also involve passing information to the DBS. (See Appendices D and E for process of reporting)

Training and Educating Instructors

Each member of the safeguarding team holds a formal safeguarding qualification, and undertake regular CPD events in order to keep updated with legislation and refresh their knowledge.

All Students facing Instructors/Tutors/Assessors undertake a Safeguarding Induction. The training received is continually reviewed to ensure most appropriate and up to date training is given. Aligning with the mandatory duty surrounding the Governments Counter Terrorism and Security Act 2015 all staff undertake "Prevent" training aligning with their role. Periodic updates surrounding key safeguarding concepts and monthly focus topics are also distributed via these internal communication channels to raise awareness and promote discussion in all areas under the wider safeguarding agenda including areas such as radicalisation, mental health issues, positive relationships, and staying safe on the internet, which will educate Instructors/Tutors/Assessors alongside giving greater knowledge to be passed onto Students.

Individuals involved in both Client Recruitment and Staff Recruitment, should complete an In-House Safer Recruitment Training Course.

Keeping Yourself Safe

Maintaining personal safety is also encouraged with the following activities being strictly prohibited:

- Befriending Students on personal social media sites
- Distributing personal telephone numbers
- Do not use sarcasm, insults or belittling comments towards Students
- Visit Students at home or transporting Students to and from locations

It also important to be mindful of the following when conducting yourself:

- You will naturally build a rapport with Students through the apprenticeship contact, and the Students may see you as a confident and support, but be sure to maintain professional boundaries whenever carrying out work on **VIBE CONCEPTS'** behalf.
- Be respectful of all young and vulnerable people, and appreciate you are in a position of trust. **VIBE CONCEPTS** have the opportunity to listen to their concerns and support them.
- Uphold confidentiality within certain remits when required by the situation, but be careful not to promise to keep secrets or ask others to do so.
- Avoid spending time alone with Students in a closed environment. If this is unavoidable for example during a formal assessment / examination ensure a member of the site staff is aware where you are and monitors this.
- Be careful when giving Students advice – as this is based on your opinion, focus support around information (facts) and guidance.
- If at any point you feel unsafe in a Student's company inform the Manager, the Designated Safeguarding Officer and leave the premises.

Keeping Students Safe

Health and safety vetting and monitoring is carried out during Students' Induction, this involves a discussion between the Instructor/Tutor/Assessor and Students and allows for the Instructor/Tutor/Assessor to be confident in their ability to keep the Students safe, also to help educate the Students in looking after their own welfare and that of others.

Students are made aware of all of **VIBE CONCEPTS'** relevant policies, who the Designated Safeguarding Officers are and how to report a concern during their induction to the programme.

All safeguarding concerns are recorded by the Designated Safeguarding Officer, appropriate action taken, and information, advice and guidance given.

Where **VIBE CONCEPTS** requires support from other companies, we will endeavour to provide appropriate training and guidance to subcontracts to ensure our policies and procedures are followed alongside the due diligence checks carried out. This will be monitored and recorded in line with current legislation.

Where **VIBE CONCEPTS** acts as a subcontract to other companies - We will commit to upholding the policies and procedures of the training provider/college which holds the funding **VIBE CONCEPTS** will also attend any relevant training / updates, adhere to monitoring requirements, be aware of and adhere to funding regulations as set out by the different funding authorities.

Future Extensions to the Safeguarding Offering

The processes and delivery to ensure Student welfare provision is continually improved, this includes observations of practice, Student and trainer interviews, sampling of documentation and analysis of data.

APPENDIX B

Statement on The Secure Storage, Handling, Use, Retention And Disposal of Disclosures And Disclosure Information

General Principles

As an organisation using the Disclosure and Barring Service (DBS) to help assess the suitability of applicants for positions of trust, **VIBE CONCEPTS** complies fully with the DBS Code of Practice regarding the correct handling, use, storage, retention and disposal of disclosures and disclosure information. It also complies fully with its obligations under the Data Protection Act and other relevant legislation pertaining with the safe handling, use, storage, retention and disposal of DBS disclosure information.

Storage and Access

Disclosure information is never kept on an Instructor personnel file and is always kept separately and securely, in lockable, non-portable, storage containers with access strictly controlled and limited to those who are entitled to see it as part of their duties.

Handling

In accordance with section 124 of the Police Act 1997, disclosure information is only passed to those who are authorised to receive it in the course of their duties. The HR Department will be responsible for maintaining a record of all those to whom disclosures or disclosure information has been revealed. It is recognised that it is a criminal offence to pass this information to anyone who is not entitled to receive it.

Usage

Disclosure information is only used for the specific purpose for which it was requested and for which the Instructor/Tutor/Assessor's full consent has been given.

Retention

Once a recruitment (or other relevant) decision has been made, **VIBE CONCEPTS** does not keep disclosure information for any longer than is absolutely necessary. This is generally for a period of up to six months, to allow for the consideration and resolution of any disputes or complaints. If, in very exceptional circumstances, it is considered necessary to keep disclosure information for longer than six months, **VIBE CONCEPTS** will consult the DBS about this before doing so. Throughout this time, the usual conditions regarding safe storage and strictly controlled access will prevail.

Disposal

Once the retention period has elapsed, **VIBE CONCEPTS** will ensure that any disclosure information is immediately destroyed by secure means, i.e. by shredding or confidential waste disposal. While awaiting destruction, disclosure information will not be kept in any insecure receptacle (e.g. waste bin or confidential waste sack). **VIBE CONCEPTS** will not keep any photocopy or other image of the disclosure or any copy or representation of the contents of a disclosure. However, **VIBE CONCEPTS** will keep a record of the date of issue of a disclosure, the name of the subject, the type of disclosure requested, the position for which the disclosure was requested, the unique reference number of the disclosure and the details of the recruitment decision taken.

APPENDIX C

DBS Disclosure Process

VIBE CONCEPTS uses a registered body responsible for authorising and processing applications for DBS checks. Successful contracted Instructors/Tutors/Assessors will be sent a DBS disclosure application form and guidance with the written offer of a contract. The completed disclosure form and associated ID documentation must be verified in person. By bringing the documents to the Manager, who will authenticate and scan the documents then forward to the Head Office or the Candidate can bring the documents to the Head Office. The Head Office is responsible for checking the form is fully completed, confirm which type of disclosure is required and will forward to the Managing Director.

The Operations Manager will then process the application and return a disclosure report to the Candidate, you are required to take the DBS Certificate to the Managing Director or the Head Office will hold a copy of the Certificate. The published DBS turnaround time is for 95% of disclosures to be sent out within 4 weeks. Wherever possible the DBS disclosure should be obtained prior to the Candidate commencing the contract, but sometimes this may not be possible. In such cases the Candidate can commence employment, but only on a supervised basis for those aspects of the job involving contact with children or adults at risk, until such time as a satisfactory disclosure report is received.

In some cases, a Candidate may already have received a satisfactory disclosure report for their current or a previous position at **VIBE CONCEPTS**. It may be appropriate to use the existing report to assess suitability for the contract, taking account of the date the report was produced and similarities between the two positions. The Head Office should be consulted in such cases.

Disclosure reports for Candidates with a substantial record of overseas residence, including current UK residents and British Nationals, may not include information on convictions from outside the UK. In most circumstances however, a disclosure report should still be sought. The DBS can also offer guidance on the availability of criminal record checks in a variety of foreign countries and the Candidate can be requested to obtain the equivalent checks from the country in question, where available or a Certificate of Good Conduct from the appropriate Countries Embassy.

If in immediate danger and out of normal working hours call the Police.

The Designated Safeguarding Officer or Designated Deputy Safeguarding Officer WILL Record ALL details - Keep relevant all parties informed of next stages / feedback where relevant, with a Response should be received with 72 Hours.

APPENDIX D2

Parent, Employer or Student Raises a concern over a Contractor of **VIBE CONCEPTS**.

In all instances call the Designated Safeguard Office or Designated Deputy Safeguarding Officer and/or Head Office.

Further investigations if required
Designated Safeguarding Officer - To carry out internal investigation

Follow procedure set out in point - Reporting Concerns.1c
Appropriate employment action taken - Feedback where appropriate. Actions taken – limited detail only – Report all relevant information to the DBS, Police and Local Safeguarding Authority.

APPENDIX D3

Ensure individual is safe from harm

Start internal reporting & whistle blowing policies - Inform Manager at site

If required - contact external agencies - Feedback only given where it is deemed appropriate

APPENDIX E

Detailed Procedure for dealing with Safeguarding Concerns – The 5 R's

1 - Recognition

Signs of abuse can be difficult to spot, as can a Student trying to find the right language to tell you about a concern. If you have any concerns over the welfare of the Student from what you have seen, heard, discussed with the Student or you have noticed changes in their behaviour which cause you safeguarding concerns, you must report it to the Designated Safeguarding Person. You do not personally have to believe the concerns in order to raise them, any concerns raised should be taken seriously. See appendix F for indicators of abuse to help.

2 - Response

No report or concerns about possible abuse should be ignored. Your main role here is to listen and record with no judgements or leading questions; use open question to gather factual details – when did it take place, who said what, what happened. You must stay calm and not let the Student know if you feel panicked or shocked.

Do not make any promises about what will happen next, but only that you will pass it onto the designated person within **VIBE CONCEPTS** and that we will do everything we can to help. It is good practice to show support and reassurance but be mindful to maintain a situation where you do not put yourself at risk. It would also be useful to have information regarding current agency support – i.e. have the police already been informed, is the person receiving local authority or medical support.

3 - Record

Ensure you record notes of the incident or disclosure as close to the time as possible. The notes should be dated and signed where possible. The notes should detail what you saw/heard or what was discussed with an individual, the names of those involved and the time, location and what action you took. Use the disclosure form where possible, but any form of notes will be acceptable.

4 - Report

Report the concerns to the Designated Safeguarding Officer, ensuring you have recorded all details as above. This communication can be face to face, via email, or phone call followed up by email. All communication and documents will remain confidential between the Designated Safeguarding Officer and individual that has reported it, unless the designated person deems it appropriate to take further action and involve other agencies.

5 - Referral

The designated person will then take the decision of what course of action should be taken. Only the designated person should be taking the decision to make referrals outside of the organisation.
